The Anglican Way of Christian Discipleship Rev. Canon Aaron Jeffrey



St. Timothy Scholarship Program Available

St. Timothy's annual Scholarship Program applications are now available. This program is open to all students going to college, university or trade school. Scholarships of \$1,000 are available, paid out in semesters. Payments are \$500 on August 15 and \$500 on December 15 for the full year.

Requirements for applications are that the student be a member of St. Timothy's and be entering or attending either a college, university, or trade school in the Fall of 2024. An application must be filled out for each year that the student applies. The original application requires a short essay on their future plans for attendance at that establishment. Two recommendations must be sent in with the first application, with at least one from a member of St. Timothy's congregation. Subsequent applications will only need the application form filled out.

If you are interested, please fill out an application and return it to the front office before July 1, 2024. The number of scholarships accepted will be based on available funds for that year. If you have any questions, please direct them to Deacon Jennifer Scherzer or Judith Jordan.

From the Organ Bench

"What is this lovely fragrance wafting like to the scent of flowers in spring? What is this light so fair, so tender, breaking upon our wondering eyes?"—Traditional French Carol

"What child is this, who, laid to rest, on Mary's lap is sleeping? Whom angels greet with anthems sweet, while shepherds watch are keeping?"—W. Chatterton Dix

"Lowly and small, the weakest of all, unlikeliest hero wrapped in His mother's shawl—just a child: is this who we've waited for?"—Marc Martel and Jason Germain

It's a question songwriters have been asking for generations: "What's this?" "Who is that?" "What on earth is going on?" in an attempt to make sense of that singularly bizarre event that took place in a Bethlehem stable two thousand years ago. And all this time later, we still haven't gotten very far. How could we? The mystery of the Incarnation has baffled not only musicians, but the greatest of theologians since it happened; what chance does the average follower of Christ have?

Well, there's good news—you don't have to get it, or rather, 'getting it' doesn't have to be something you do logically with your brain. When God moves, Creation responds. This might be part of why the angels appeared to "certain poor shepherds in fields as they lay"—certainly not the brightest of customers—yet God chose them to bear witness to the perfect response to Christ's birth: unbridled songs of praise to the Lord God. You know what happened next: "And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them" (Lk 2:20). Like Mary (see Lk 2:19) they understood with their heart what no head could fathom.

Music is a response from the soul to how God is moving through His world. It is an ascent—an amen to the sovereign Lord of the Universe when words alone are inadequate. That is why so much of the saints' time in Revelation is spent in singing and praise. Words are not enough.

So it doesn't matter if we don't understand everything God is doing, and it doesn't matter if we don't understand how to sing His praises properly, well, or even at all. We must sing. We must move our spirit in resonance with His; it's part of our calling as created beings.

At 5:00pm on Sunday, February 4th, the choir and I will be responding to that call with a service of Evensong (a predominantly sung form of Evening Prayer), featuring music composed almost entirely by in-house composers here at St. Timothy's. I hope you will be moved to join us, binding your prayers with ours as an earnest answer and expression of gratitude to the Spirit of creativity that thrives in all of God's created.


